

PRESIDENTS REPORT

2024 has been another successful year for Wellington North Badminton. The work being done by the Board, Richard and all our staff has resulted in more people than ever being able to enjoy our sport. We have more players utilizing the hall resulting in more demand for court time.

Several successful tournaments were held during the year including: WN Open, NI U19, Capital Singles, Box Challenge, BCD competition and the WN Junior Championships. Our Slazenger / Wisden team had another successful season and came 6th in their competition.

Work has been done to upgrade the multipurpose room, extend the office and develop a room for massage, physio and nutritionist. Roof repairs will be completed by the time my report reaches you. This has been a large undertaking and will keep the courts dry during rain for the foreseeable future.

Our financial performance continues to be robust, and I would like to thank Deane, who has provided us with his astute guidance. Richard has played a sterling role in our funding endeavors and, in comparison to other sports organisations, we have had good success with our funding agencies and sponsors.

The Board has been very active, and I would like to thank Lesley, Julie, Kelly, Ian and Leck, for volunteering their precious time and inimitable skills. Julie has been instrumental in shaping us into a highly functioning group which is the envy of many other badminton associations. Kelly has helped us develop a new constitution which will hold us in good stead for many years to come. Our Statement of Strategic Direction is due to run until the end of 2026, but we have decided to review it early because most of our targets have already been achieved. We will do this over the current year under Julie's seasoned tutelage.

We are pleased to welcome Bevan Cox to the Board as an Intern. It is great to have someone his age adds a new voice to our discussions. We have no elected positions coming vacant at this AGM but several of us are due for re-election or re- appointment in 2027. We are looking to manage any transition or shortfall to maintain continuity in Board Membership.

GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

Overview of 2024

The year 2024 has been incredibly successful for the WNBA community, marked by significant achievements across all areas of the organisation.

It has effectively been the snowball effect – where we have gained so much momentum that we have had to make small changes to ensure we maintain a quality experience for all our players and have sustainable programs and products moving forward

Team WN Results

We had more teams participate in Badminton NZ competitions than ever before, with exceptional results across the board:

- Junior Badminton: We fielded an Under-thirteen team for the first time, which won Division 2 at the NZJTC and has been promoted to Division 1 for the 2025 season. Our U17 team also performed well, securing third place in Division 2.
- Senior Badminton: Our top team earned promotion to the Wisden league, while our division three team was promoted to the Slazenger Cup (Division 2) for 2025. Additionally, our Central Region team won the Central competition.
- Masters: We entered a new Masters Division 2 team, which claimed victory in their grade. Our division 1 Masters team finished fifth, and our division three team placed sixth.
- **Vets**: After several years of not entering a team in this grade, our new Vets team finished a strong second in Division 3.
- Super Vets: The Super Vets team achieved a remarkable third place finish in Division 1, marking their best-ever result.

Roof Project

We undertook a significant project to repair and replace our roof, which had been leaking and showing signs of wear. After careful consideration, we opted to repair the existing roof rather than undergo a full reroofing, which would have cost around \$500K and required a temporary closure of the centre. The chosen solution, priced at approximately \$180K, involves addressing damaged areas and applying a durable membrane to extend the roof's lifespan by up to 20 years. We are grateful for the generous funding support from Wellington City Council, NZ Lotteries, and Grass Roots Central, which allowed us to minimize the use of our LTMF.

Court Availability

To enhance court access, we adjusted the Stadium Pass product. These changes allow members to access more court time during off-peak hours, with a discounted rate for peak times. As of December, we have seen a record number of Stadium Pass holders, and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.

Events

The 2024 events calendar exceeded expectations, thanks to the hard work and dedication of Chanmony, Babette, and Rhys, who consistently raised the bar for our events.

- The WN Open attracted 139 players, making it the largest entry of any Open sanctioned event in NZ in 2024, just slightly fewer than 2023.
- The BCD had 217 entries, an 18% increase from the previous year.
- We also introduced the Capital Singles Event, held at Te Rauparaha Arena.

Chanmony has completed her role with WNBA, and we are pleased to welcome Winson Wong, who will temporarily fill her position.

Shuttle Time Program

In 2024, we delivered Shuttle Time to over 1,000 children we also utilised including Amesbury School and Newlands Intermediate. This has helped us make badminton more accessible to a wider community. Additionally, Babette ran a successful Shuttle Time Coaches course, with twenty participants passing their Coaching assessment—some of whom are now teaching badminton within the local community.

Facility

We completed a renovation of our centre Lining and Insulating as well as slightly reducing the space used by the TKD club, adding a new room for physiotherapy services. The office space was also expanded to ensure a more spacious working environment for the team.

Pickleball

Pickleball has grown significantly, and we now offer three weekly sessions (Monday, Wednesday, and Friday). The sport has attracted many of our badminton players and new members to our centre, its growth has been a fantastic addition to our offering. The sessions take place in the morning and have had minimal impact on badminton court availability whilst enhancing revenue during off-peak periods.

Venue Hire

In 2024, our upstairs rooms were frequently used, providing a valuable additional revenue stream for the non-court areas of our Stadium.

- Red Cross continued to offer first aid training, with additional courses held at our venue.
- Our Board Room was rented by various groups, with MTA and IPM becoming regular users.
- The NEW Consulting Room was rented out to a physiotherapist from November, as well as being used for photo shoots and massage clinics.

- Badminton NZ decided to hold their Hui and AGM at WNBA in 2024.
- Senior Nationals WNBA have been confirmed as the Host for the 2025 Event We have never
 hosted this event previously, so this is a true testament to the profile of WNBA and the quality of
 our Facility and Operation
- We defended the Compton Cup and have now won this for the past 4 years
- We also defended the Lindsay Johnson Cup for Juniors and have now held this for the last 2 years.

COMMUINTY DEVELOPMENT REPORT

2024 has been busy on the courts at WNBA.

We held our regular Open day on 27th January. This was very well received with many families and individuals coming along, over 250 people, having a go, playing games, doing drills and having fun.

Shuttle Time programs for children and adults are continuing to be popular with classes at capacity. (250 children, 12 adults attending classes and 50 at junior clubs a week) We introduced a class each at Amesbury school for both beginner children and adults, for 2 terms and 2 children's classes at Newlands Intermediate for 2 terms.

We have increased our gold class from one class a week to 2 classes a week to allow for the numbers of children who are further along their pathway towards representative play. The growth in talent is impressive and a measure of the success of the shuttle time program here at WNBA.

Our adult classes are meeting the needs of those players wanting to learn to play and/or improve their skills in a safe and fun environment that is childfree. Classes are full and the demand is great with enquiries coming in every week for classes.

We ran the Racketlon holiday program in January and April school holidays with numbers slightly down on last year. With that in mind we did not run Racketlon for the rest of the year and concentrated instead on badminton only school holidays programs. These were extremely popular with numbers exceeding all expectations.

As we did not receive funding from Nuku Ora this year we were not able to go into as many schools as we would have liked to. Many schools in our catchment area are low decile and do not have the resources to support Badminton.

Funding is a huge barrier to participation as is travel and staff availability. However, we were able to provide badminton at several schools for the year, Porirua primary school, Newlands College, Onslow college, Aotea College, Saint Brigid's Primary School, Cardinal McKeefry Primary school, Holy Family Primary School and Victoria University trials.

We did attend the Porirua primary schools Move and Groove days at Te Rauparaha Arena, an event with over 500 children from all Porirua area schools attending. The Tamariki all loved playing badminton and Rhys was popular with the Tamariki who recognized him from facilitating lessons at their schools.

Once again in terms 2 and 3 we ran the intermediate league for years 7 and 8 on a Wednesday after school. Teams' of 4/5 youngsters represented their school and competed against each other in a round robin league. This was popular with quite a few of the children who then came to our shuttle time classes after attending the league. (Iollies for prizes were popular too)

Another group that visited our stadium for a fun day was Special Olympics NZ. Over 60 Young athletes with intellectual impairments came for a day to experience pickleball and have fun. The day was a resounding success with many teachers and teacher-aides expressing surprise at how many of their students participated and enjoyed the day. The feedback from the young people was that they loved it and didn't want to go home.

Due to strain on the courts (reaching capacity at peak times) and difficulty meeting the needs of all players we have expanded to include Tawa rec Centre and Nairnville rec Centre. We are only able to book these courts for an hour and a half each per week (at weekends) but are making good use of them for training juniors and Khandallah club.

Pickleball is growing in popularity with over 80 members in our books and on average 5-10 casual players attending each week. We have added an extra pop in session each week on a Monday as well as the usual Wednesday and Friday sessions. We ran a team competition mid-year and a doubles box challenge later in the year. Those players who participated were all positive in their feedback and the standard of play has been raised due to players having the opportunity to play repeatedly with the same partners and compete. Players have asked for more competitive events in 2025 as they enjoyed them so much.



Our season started with Wellington North winning the Lindsay Johnson Cup. This is a junior mixed age group event between Wellington, Hutt Valley and Wellington North.

The Central Region Junior competition saw us entering 8 teams, 3 x U13, 1x U15, 1x U17 and 3x U19's. This is held over 2 weekends, the 1st as a Capital Derby and the finals in Palmerston North.

RESULTS

It is wonderful to see so many U 13 players wanting to play rep badminton. This shows how successful our Shuttle time program is, in bringing the young players through.

We then waited eagerly for the results of the Wellington vs Hutt Valley tie, which would determine whether we'd make the playoffs. HV managed to get the win in a countback which then put us in top qualifying spot – for the Play Offs

Playoffs: We travelled down south for the playoffs against Nelson and Southland. Though we were missing our star singles player, and had a few players out, we didn't let it hold us back. Kyoko returned to the team, and we added Diana who had played for us previously, filling We faced Southland first, who had just defeated Nelson, and came through with a 9-3 victory. We then beat Nelson 8-4, securing our spot in Slazenger Cup for the next season. It was a fantastic finish to a great season!

The team spirit and commitment were immense – WNBA have never had two teams in Slaz / Wisden so 2025 looks to be an exciting year for us.



We welcomed Graham Parker into the team, that lowered the average age of the team. Graham fitted in well as he understands the social connection is just as important as on court play.


The broken wrist meant I missed the final tie so the team, so Kay Kanaris (North Harbour) once again stepped in and played.

Our Future

Looking ahead to 2025, a substantial 35% increase in shuttlecock costs since the club's inception poses a considerable challenge. The increase in shuttlecock costs is mainly due to the devaluation of New Zealand dollars (-13%) and a shortage of goose feathers. We hope WNBA will consider maintaining lower court hire and commitment fees for the club to support its sustainability.

The Morena Club will explore the possibility of setting up as a non-profit organization or registering as a social club in 2025 to apply for sponsorship. Additionally, in 2025, the Morena Badminton Club plans to invite other morning clubs from other associations to play against the Morena Club members or join us for social events.
